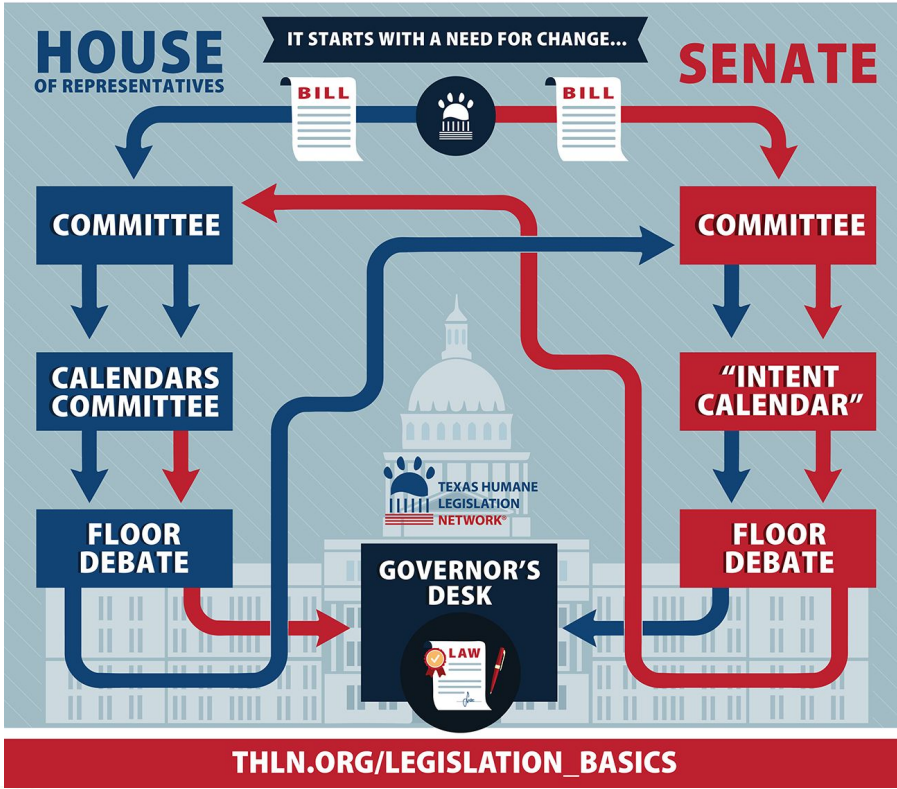

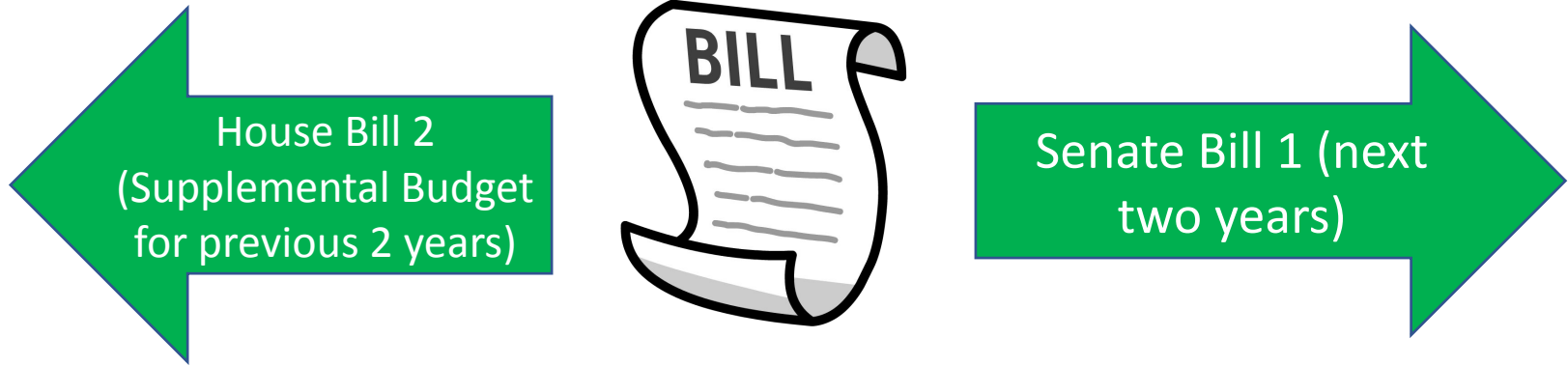

HOW A BILL BECOMES A LAW IN TEXAS

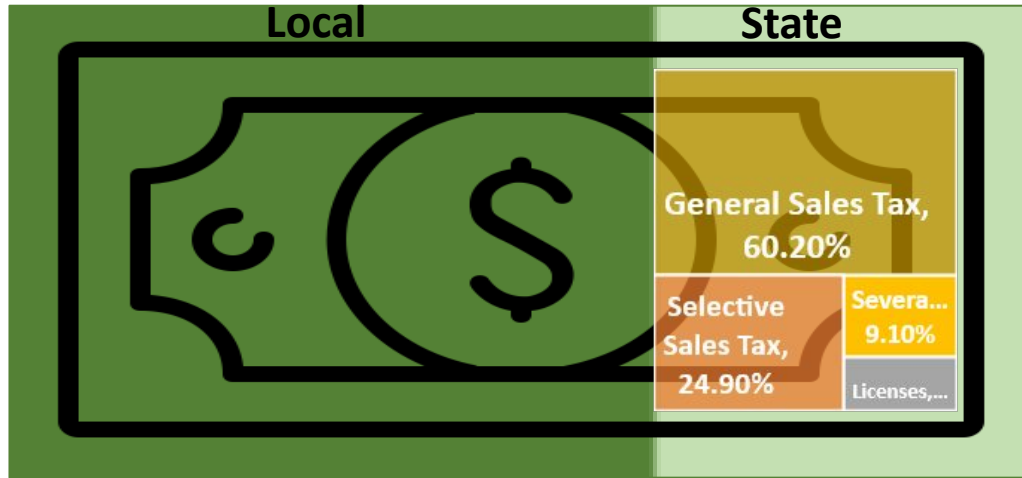


If a bill has not been heard in Committee at this point, it's on life support. However, the language from dead bills can always come back to life in other pieces of legislation.

The Texas legislature must pass a balanced budget, based on how much revenue is available to spend.



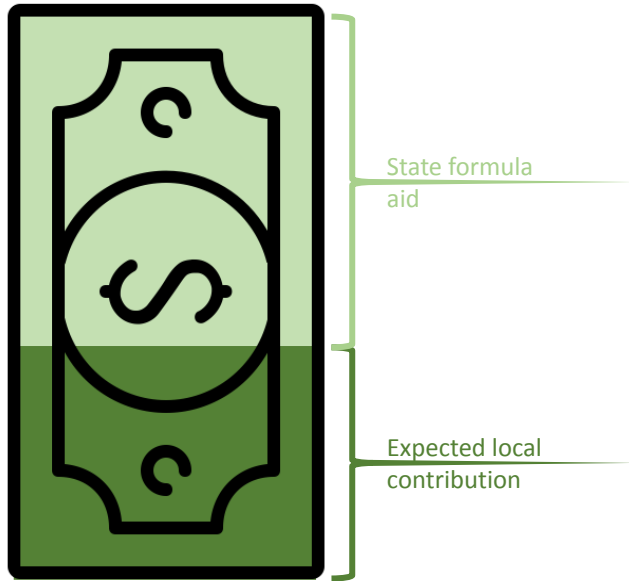
State revenue is not down as much as many feared, especially with help from the federal government.



Federal relief funds
($\$17.9$ billion from ESSER II and III)

State revenue is down, but only slightly – less than $\$1$ billion for the previous two years and less than $\$500$ million for the next two years. The total state budget is $\sim\$112$ billion.

What We Know: Formula cuts unlikely

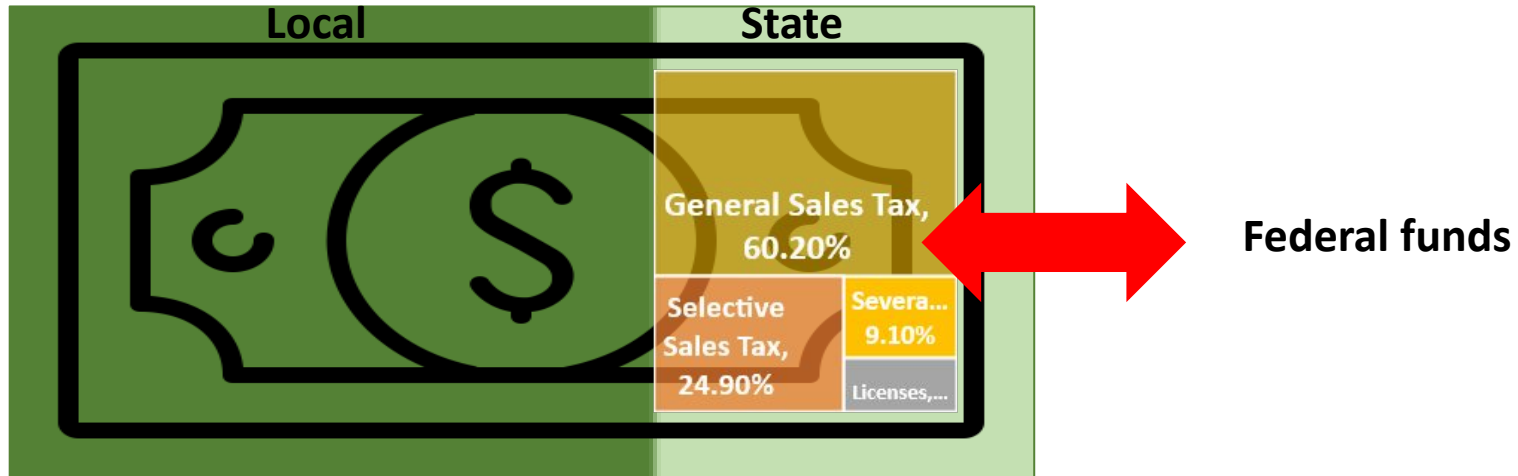


Both the Texas House and Senate budget proposals fully fund the formula.

In other words, no major changes are expected to the formula or the state's ability to pay its share for the next two years ... for now.

What We Don't Know: Timing and use of federal funds

Neither Senate Bill 1 nor House Bill 2 includes the \$17.9B from ESSER II and III. The state can use federal funds to replace (or "supplant") state formula funds so it can direct that revenue outside of formula or outside of education entirely.

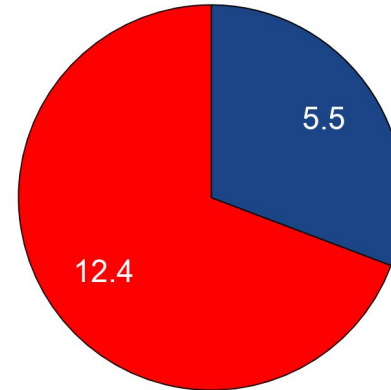


What We Don't Know: Maintenance of Effort

To receive ESSER II and III funds, states must spend **at least the same share of total state spending on PK-12 education and higher education combined** over the next two years as they did, on average in 2017 - 2019.

Texas may need to invest an additional \$1.2B in higher education to meet this requirement.

The Governor submitted a waiver request to the U.S. Department of Education in late February and has not received a response.

Outside of the budget, key bills to address unfinished learning:



- HB 5 / SB 5: Broadband expansion
- HB 4117: High-quality tutoring
- HB 4545: Strong Foundations Grant, accelerated learning committees, and outcomes bonuses
- HB 4465: Grants for extended instructional time, broadband, curriculum and instruction, air and water quality, and accelerated learning

Legislative Summary and Ongoing Policy



**HOUSE BILL 5:
BROADBAND FOR TEXANS**

The COVID-19 pandemic has underscored the need for reliable access to internet and exposed the breadth of ways in which connectivity impacts daily life. House Bill 5 aims to make measurable progress towards closing the digital gap for Texans.



THE PROBLEM: The digital divide continues to widen and leads to social and economic gaps between those who have access to internet and those who do not. Now is the time for the state to step in and help close the gap for the many Texans that still lack access or face barriers to the subscription of broadband.

THE SOLUTION: HOUSE BILL 5

- Creates the Broadband Development Office within the Office of the Comptroller, which will:
 - **Prepare the State Broadband Plan** | Texas is currently one of only six states without a state plan. This puts Texas at a disadvantage when applying for federal dollars.
 - **Participate in proceedings at the Federal Communications Commission** | Federal broadband maps have traditionally been inaccurate. Texas can complement the FCC's new mapping initiative by actively working to improve its accuracy.
- **Produce the Broadband Development Map** | With granular, address level data the state can better identify which areas of Texas need the most help.
- **Administer the Broadband Development Program** | This program will make certain that any private, federal, or state funding is ready to be delivered to applicants so service can be expanded as soon as possible.

Legislation to support effective teaching and students

- > **HB 4117 (TALARICO) / SB 2023 (POWELL)** establish the Texas Tutor Corps grant program
 - Leverage federal stimulus dollars and existing state educational programs (e.g. compensatory education)
 - Align to the PATHS to Tutor Act (S.457)
 - Leadership interest in both chambers
 - Broad coalition of supporting state organizations
- > **HB 4545 AND 4465 (DUTTON) / SB 2094 (TAYLOR)** relate to federal education funding
 - Possible vehicles for mobilizing aspiring teachers (and others) as tutors

Design parameters

High-quality tutoring:

- One-on-one or in a small group
- Multiple sessions each week
- Content- and grade-specific tutors are matched with students
- Aligned to the local standards & curriculum
- Includes ongoing support to tutors

Funding provides:

- Matching, training, placing tutors with schools
- Stipends for tutors and mentors
- Instructional and connectivity resources
- Transportation, meals and snacks, and facilities

Other considerations:

- Prioritize recruitment of teacher-candidates
- Serve high-need schools
- Flexible delivery modalities (e.g. in-person, virtual)
- Closely aligned to school calendar
- Includes SEL, CLR, and trauma-informed practices





HB 4465 (Dutton)

- Establishes COVID recovery grants for extended learning, broadband, curriculum and instruction innovations, air and water facility improvements, and accelerated learning
- Empowers the Commissioner to determine the terms of grants and administer them
- Empowers the Commissioner to resolve federal maintenance of effort and maintenance of equity issues



HB 4545 (Dutton)

- Establishes an accelerated learning committee for students who fail STAAR in grades 3, 5 and 8 and requires at least 30 hours of supplemental instruction
- Establishes the Strong Foundations Grant Program for elementary schools to implement high-quality instructional materials, curricula and aligned professional supports
- Adds an outcomes bonus for accelerating and sustaining student proficiency (2X for “educationally disadvantaged”)
